There are three main positions regarding the relationship between language and cognition: language develops largely independent of cognition, cognition influences both language and the pace of language development, and language precedes cognition and is the primary influence on thought development.

What Is the Connection between Language and Cognition?

Tomasello 2003 presents a usage-based theory of first language acquisition; Goldberg 2006 is concerned with the emergence of grammatical generalizations and the nature of our grammatical knowledge; and Bates and MacWhinney 1989 proposes a psycholinguistic model of sentence processing and acquisition, the "Competition Model," that is closely related to usage-based research in functional and cognitive linguistics.
