Exhibit 1 illustrates the cumulative effects of expansion on states' Medicaid spending using data from the National Association of State Budget Officers (NASBO). 4 Excluding the first state fiscal year of expansion (which was half preexpansion and half postexpansion), Medicaid expansion increases total Medicaid spending by approximately 23 ...

How could the Patients First Act cover half as many Georgians while costing twice as much as Medicaid expansion? As part of the Affordable Care Act, the federal government agrees to pay 90 percent of the costs if states expand health care access to people earning less than 138 percent FPL—about \$35,000 for a family of four. States can leverage this 9-to-1 funding match through Medicaid expansion or a state plan, called an 1115 waiver, to accomplish similar goals with more tailored approaches.

### Kemp's Medicaid plan would cover thousands, but not most ...

A provision in the Affordable Care Act called for expansion of Medicaid eligibility in order to cover more low-income Americans. Under the expansion, Medicaid eligibility would be extended to adults up to age 64 with incomes up to 138 percent of the federal poverty level (133 percent plus a 5 percent income disregard).

### Mississippi should expand Medicaid: Commentary

Around 25 percent of the state's population qualifies for Medicaid, more than half are children. Currently Alabama receives a 73 percent funding match from the federal government to cover Medicaid expenses. With expansion, that match would increase to 90 percent, but with some associated costs.

Medicaid is a public health insurance program that currently covers half of Georgia's children, some low-income seniors and people with disabilities, low- and moderate-income pregnant women, and very low-income parents.

As discussed in DHHS's fiscal impact analysis on Medicaid expansion (linked above), the federal government is expected to cover 90 percent of costs related to medical services for the eligibility group outlined in Initiative 427.

### Fast Facts on Medicaid Expansion - Georgia Budget and ...

The U.S. Supreme Court later ruled that the Medicaid expansion is voluntary with states. As a result, some states haven't expanded their Medicaid programs. Adults in those states with incomes below 100% of the federal poverty level, and who don't qualify for Medicaid based on disability, age, or other factors, fall into a gap.

So even with a fee, Medicaid expansion would be better for them than the status quo. It's also worth noting that the legislation includes a stipulation that monthly premiums for Medicaid expansion enrollees could not exceed 2 percent of income (it's not clear, however, if the \$25/month "fee" would be considered a premium). For a single person, that would amount to a premium cap of less than \$25/month as long as their income didn't exceed \$15,000/year (under Medicaid expansion ...

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
